



Mission 10 Africa Great Lakes Region 2015


'Listening' *Isaiah 30:18-21*


EGEE Goma: Every month it is a mammoth challenge for Simeon and his team to find the disinfectant supplies, clean clothes kits, shavers, medicines, juice and bread to take into the Juvenile facility for De-Bugging Day. We cannot tell you how difficult this task is, and yet they persevere. They also manage a literacy 'school', spiritual and life skills counselling, regular medical checkups and family reunification for these destitute and traumatized young girls and boys.

Assani is in charge of Bible Study at the **Goma Central Prison** for adult males. The facility, built for 150 inmates, now houses more than 1500. The conditions are appalling and dangerous. We do not know how to pray, but the Spirit intercedes for us with groans....

The **WoW** (Women's Wellness) group is busy. There are 32 new women in this year's sewing class. Their literacy classes are going well, as are the public health

and childcare programs. One of our goals is to provide the sewing graduates who would like to start a business with a sewing machine for their personal use.

The **dispensary** at the Petit Sanctuaire Goma, which hangs on by a thread in every way, treats hundreds each month, including the incarcerated juveniles and exceptional cases from the women's and men's prisons. We have seen remarkable improvement in the health of those involved in our programs. It is particularly heartwarming to see the babies doing well.

Care packages remain a special part of our ministry. So far this year, dozens of Hospitality Bags, countless bars of soap, hundreds of pens and notebooks for literacy classes, and over 950 pairs of underwear have been given out - always with a smile!

Rwanda Letters Project: God continues to work miracles in the lives of victim - survivors of the genocide and offenders still in prison. The weekly meetings between the two continue. These victims you see here suffered the loss of several dozen members of their families who were tortured and betrayed by their neighbours. Now, 21 years later, in the presence of our chaplains, they are prepared to visit the offender in prison and offer forgiveness. Over 250 meetings have taken place. Amazing, humbling signs of hope and healing.

Pierre and I were not the only ones with medical problems this past year. Many of our team members have health issues. A lifetime of conflict, insecurity, poor nutrition and the various stresses and complications of poverty have left them at risk. So we began in faith a new program called **Gisenyi GO** (God and Ourselves). We have opened the Petit Sanctuaire Gisenyi three weekends a month to 2-4 people for rest and renewal. A time to 'get away', with food, water and accommodation taken care of, no kids, no responsibilities, walks to the lake, quiet time in the garden. The response has been incredible. We have to find a way to keep this going!
